US and Ugandan Hospices Celebrated for Outstanding Partnership

Global Partners in Care presents the 2015 Global Partnership Award to Samaritan Healthcare and Hospice of New Jersey and Kawempe Home Care of Uganda.

Samaritan Healthcare and Hospice is over 7,000 miles away from Kawempe Home Care of Uganda yet the two organizations are partners in caring. Global Partners in Care presented the 2015 Global Partnership Award to the two organizations at NHPCO's annual Management and Leadership Conference, an event that brought over 1,200 hospice and palliative care leaders to the Washington, DC area. The Global Partnership Award recognizes the exemplary work of one partnership that has demonstrated leadership, innovation and has significantly contributed to the sustainable development of hospice and palliative care through their Global Partners in Care partnership. The award winner is selected based on creativity in fundraising, partner collaboration, staff contribution and commitment, and community outreach and involvement. "Samaritan feels both elated and humbled to be chosen for the 2015 Global Partnership Award from the 80 U.S. hospices which have chosen to share resources, expertise, and friendship with a sister hospice across the globe," says Samaritan President and CEO, Mary Ann Boccolini. "On behalf of all those hospices, we welcome the opportunity to participate more fully in our global village."

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Samaritan and Kawempe engaged in a multitude of partnership activities throughout the year. Through fundraising efforts and special events, Samaritan was able to purchase a used 2000 four-wheeldrive Toyota Land Cruiser to help Kawempe staff better access their patients and families who lived in difficult terrain. They also provided Kawempe with laptop computers, palliative care text books, stethoscopes, blood pressure cuffs, a camera, and children's clothing.

In 2014, two staff members from Kawempe visited Samaritan. During their visit they participated in many educational, social, and cultural activities including shadowing clinical staff, attending team meetings, touring a hospital and inpatient unit, attending a reception for staff and volunteers, a day trip to NYC, and the Philadelphia Zoo.

The partners maintain excellent communication despite the miles between them. Monthly Skype calls are made to discuss needs, goals, and ongoing projects. Distance learning seminars are available so that the partners can educate current and new staff members.

"Samaritan has been truly blessed to partner with Kawempe Home Care since 2010. Our partnership with KHC allows us to fulfill an integral part of our Philosophy of Care: To recognize the unity of life and our connectedness with each other, those we care for, our community, and our world," says Samaritan Healthcare & Hospice VP, Marketing and Public Affairs, Joanne Rosen. "This partnership has provided new avenues for our staff and volunteers to engage with each other and with our community – providing a rich new dimension to the passion they already feel for the benefits of hospice and palliative care."

The recipient of the award receives a \$500 donation for their international hospice partner.

"The future of the partnership is really very bright, we have set up programs for medical





Partners Focusing on Compassion

In addition to the winner being announced, several Global Partners in Care partnerships received "Honorable Mention" for the 2015 Global Partnership Award. We would like to acknowledge those partnerships and highlight some of their 2014 accomplishments.

Lifetime Care & Zululand Hospice

Bought South African fabric and made pillows, placemats, purses, phone bags, wine bags and sold to raise funds for Zululand Hospice. Lifetime Care raised over \$14K for their partner.

A team of 13 traveled to South Africa in May 2014. The team visited patients, worked at an orphanage and transformed a chicken house into a kitchen.

Hospice and Community Care executed several different fundraising initiatives to raise over \$10K for the Kenya Hospice & Palliative Care Association including a spring bling and holiday sale.

Sent educational materials to 60 caregivers involved with the palliative care program.

Vitas Healthcare-Inland Empire raised over \$9K for their partner.

Support Scholarships for Nurses and Social Workers in Africa

The Opportunity:

As part of our mission to expand the availability of hospice and palliative care in Africa and globally, Global Partners in Care has a special scholarship fund to support the African Palliative Care Association (APCA) in providing education scholarships to further the knowledge and skill of African nurses and social workers in the provision of palliative care.

The Need:

In many African nursing and social work courses, there is no training which exposes the students to palliative care. Formal training in palliative care is greatly needed to provide nurses and social workers with the much needed palliative care skills to handle patients with life threatening illnesses such as HIV/AIDS and cancer.

The Impact:

To date, the scholarship program has benefited 11 nurses and 6 social workers who have undertaken formal palliative care training. The scholarship fund has also supported 10 nurses to attend the Palliative Care Association of Uganda's bi-annual conference. Scholarship recipients have come from various countries including Kenya, Nigeria, South Africa, Malawi and Cameroon.
