Training Palliative Care Leaders in Africa

Ndzi Eric Ngah is a registered nurse pursuing a Master of Science in Palliative Care at the Institute for Hospice and Palliative Care in Africa (IHPCA) in Uganda. Eric previously received a scholarship through the APCA/GPIC African Palliative Care Education Scholarship Fund in 2011 which allowed him to pursue a long-distance Diploma in Palliative Care at IHPCA. Eric has been working in palliative care since completing his diploma and serves as a palliative care nurse and supervises palliative care services within the Cameroon Baptist Convention Health Service. Eric has seen the benefit of the palliative care approach with his patients and their families. But he has also seen how palliative care is limited as awareness among communities and healthcare providers is low. This has piqued his interest in furthering his own palliative care training so he can share knowledge and skills with others. This year, Eric started his master's at IHPCA and is soon completing his second semester exams.

"I am in this master's so that I can gain in-depth knowledge and become more qualified to teach in the health care institutions, nursing and medical schools in my country – a thing that has not been given any close attention. More research will be done on palliative care and the findings used to improve the service in my country and beyond. Gaining knowledge on advocacy will help me approach policymakers to ensure that palliative care is prioritized as part of universal health coverage.

Eric is not only training staff in his own institution, but also reaching out to the public to increase awareness through radio talk shows and visits to communities to talk about palliative care. There is also an internally displaced population in Cameroon due to the sociopolitical crisis in the country. Eric and his colleagues are conducting online education for palliative care workers on management of cases in crisis situation.

The goal of our scholarship program is to expand the trained palliative care workforce in countries across Africa. But it is also important to deepen learning for those who seek to be leaders in palliative care in their community and country. Higher level degrees such as the Master of Science in Palliative Care at IHPCA increase the awareness, clinical and research skills and knowledge of palliative care for scholarship recipients so they can become advocates and palliative care educators to diverse in-country stakeholders. This is exactly what Eric is doing and we are pleased to support his efforts to establish greater access to necessary and compassionate palliative care in Cameroon.

The demand for palliative care education in Africa is much greater than we can accommodate, and we seek to grow our scholarship program in number and scope. World Hospice and Palliative Care Day Celebrations Continue

The Palliative Care Association of Malawi (PACAM) held a day of celebrations on the 11th of November to bring awareness to hospice and palliative care services in Malawi. The event was put on in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and other partners including Lighthouse, Kamuzu Central Hospital, University of Carolina, Baylor International, National AIDS Commission and Malawi Interfaith Association.



Organizations shared information about their work in palliative care, while patients and families shared their stories about the value of palliative care. In addition, several dignitaries from the government participated.



In line with the international theme for WHPCD, *Healing Hearts and Communities*, PACAM organized interdenominational prayers and music. Choirs from five different faith traditions performed and leaders from these traditions also prayed together. The advisor to the president on religious affairs joined as well.
