Healing Hearts and Communities

On October 8, palliative care organizations around the world celebrated World Hospice and Palliative Care Day. This annual event, put on by the Worldwide Hospice Palliative Care Alliance (WHPCA), is a day of action to celebrate and support palliative care work. This year's theme was "Healing Hearts and Communities," which acknowledges the need for support and healing in the wake of the grief and suffering caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and global conflicts. Around the world, our partners and collaborators advocated for palliative care in unique and meaningful ways.

In Uganda, the Palliative Care Association of Uganda (PCAU) hosted a Twitter space with national healthcare leaders about access to important medications. The following day, they hosted the National Palliative Care Walk at the Mulago National Referral Hospital playground. After the walk, PCAU put on a celebratory football (soccer) match between palliative care providers and parliamentarians. To learn more about PCAU's efforts, check out their **Twitter**. Hospice Africa Uganda celebrated the day by hosting the Voices for Hospice Concert to raise awareness and fundraise for their work.



In South Africa, the Hospice and Palliative Care Association of South Africa (HPCA) led a national campaign calling for people to wear ribbons on their wrists to show they were grieving or as a sign of solidarity with others who are grieving. Khanya Hospice celebrated WHPCD by doing what they have done for 37 years – delivering palliative care nursing to patients in need with passion and determination. Hospices across Kenya had various celebrations and events to mark the day. In Ethiopia, Hospice Ethiopia's executive director, Ephrem Abathun, shared a special message: "Regardless of ethnicity, social status or gender, the transcendental significance of human connection produces a need for relief from pain and suffering, which is the idea behind palliative care."

In the US, GPIC celebrated the day by wearing ribbons on our wrists to show our solidarity with those who are grieving. Additionally, GPIC intern Ethan Harned gave presentations to groups at the University of Notre Dame on global palliative care. Hospice of the North Coast in California and Nkhoma Mission Hospital in Malawi, winners of the 2021 Global Partnership Award, shared awareness of their global partnership in celebration of the day.

Hats on for Children's Palliative Care is a day for increasing recognition of the need for children's palliative care (CPC) and to highlight the important work of CPC worldwide. Supporters from across the globe put on a hat and shared their pictures in solidarity.
