Making Partner Connections

We recently held group Zoom meetings for our partners, bringing together our US partners on one call and then our African partners on another. These town hall-style meetings let GPIC provide a few updates and field comments, answer questions and facilitate discussion among the partners. Partners provided valuable feedback to GPIC as well as sharing, listening and learning from one another.

There are common challenges facing our partners in Africa such as impacts of climate disasters on their work, the need to train more leaders in palliative care on the continent, the impact of decreasing financial resources and the need for sustainability models. Partners exchanged ideas on tackling these issues and GPIC will also explore ways we might help them collectively face these challenges.



US partners shared fundraising ideas and thoughts on addressing the challenges of sustaining a partnership through organizational leadership changes.

The calls also spurred many individual follow-up conversations between partners. For example, an organization in Malawi is now sharing more on their work to involve chaplains in palliative care with an organization in Uganda who is just getting started on this.

US partners swapped ideas on how to engage staff on a deeper level. They also shared creative fundraising ideas like focusing on a specific project that staff can rally around or getting your CEO on a roller coaster to raise money!

These calls are one way in which we will continue to expand our network of sharing and connecting partners for opportunities to learn and grow their impact. Partners like learning about the work their colleagues across the continent are doing and appreciate the ideas it generates for their own organization. We encourage partners to continue to share stories of impact with us so that we can include them in this newsletter and beyond!
